# Regional Workshop on Cost-Effectiveness Analysis: Tools for Decision-Making in Health

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#### **Background and Rationale (1)**

- Five Regional Priorities identified in 2012
  - Health System Strengthening
  - Noncommunicable Diseases
  - Maternal and Child Health
  - Communicable diseases
  - Emergency preparedness and response
- Need for Economic Evidence!
- Collaboration with the Disease Control Priority Network at the University of Washington
- First round of capacity building in February 2013

#### **Background and Rationale (2)**

- EMRO work in Health System Strengthening for Universal Health Coverage
  - 59<sup>th</sup> Regional Committee paper on Health Systems challenges, priorities, strategies and options.
  - 60<sup>th</sup> Regional Committee paper on Universal Health Coverage
  - 61st Regional Committee paper and the focus on Social Health Insurance for Universal Health Coverage

#### Purpose:

- To build further research capacities in the area of health economic evaluation and engage with the previously trained researchers to advance their ongoing studies
- To share up-to-date developments in economic evaluation techniques and some regional and international country applications
- To discuss a plan of action to assist individual Member States in adopting and implementing economic evaluation techniques

#### **Specific Objectives:**

- Provide participants with a conceptual understanding of CEA and ECEA
- Review the steps and data needed to conduct a modeled health economic evaluation
- Transfer the method and template model to enable participants to conduct a CEA or an ECEA on a policy or intervention related to the five regional priorities
- Establish collaborative research teams of regional and global economic experts
- Begin work on joint Economic Evaluations studies in EMR countries
- Enable participants to contribute to the evidence-base of health economic evaluation in their respective countries

#### Workshop structure (1)

- The Workshop shall be divided into two parts.
- Part I provides a review of the theoretical basis of health economic evaluation, and offers a refresher on how to design, perform, and interpret an economic evaluation independently
  - Health economic evaluation and priority setting
  - Modelling of health intervention effectiveness
  - Reporting cost-effectiveness results
  - Sensitivity and uncertainty analysis
  - Issues in data sources, consistency, and bias

### Workshop structure (2)

 Part II introduces the concept of Extended Cost-Effectiveness Analysis (ECEA), where evidence from CEA is augmented with information on Financial Risk Protection and Equity consequences
